

Dear Congregations

The four of us went to the Netherlands for the October break, and we had a lovely time. We ate lots of cheese and caramel wavers, walked for miles alongside the canals, and then, of course, we laughed a lot! Nehan's favourite thing was the Dutch clogs – he desperately wanted me to buy him a bright orange pair... But after much deliberation he settled for orange clog look-a-like *slippers* (which he put on straight away and never took off until we arrived home)! Henro was fascinated with the windmills. I've never been inside a windmill before, and it was very interesting to see how it works. If the wind doesn't blow, nothing happens. But as soon as the wind picks up, the machinery inside the windmill starts working and continues to work as long as the wind is blowing.

And standing outside a huge windmill, looking at the big arms turning in the wind, I thought that God works through us in a very similar way. He sent us his Spirit, and through his Spirit we are able to be the people he wants us to be and to do the things he wants us to do. The Holy Spirit is our "wind", and interestingly the word used for "Spirit" in the Old Testament can also be translated as "wind".


We can't see the wind, but looking at the arms of a windmill, we can easily see the *effect* of the wind. We can't see God's Spirit either, but we can see the effect of his Spirit when we are able to handle things, say things and do things that we thought impossible.


The only difference between the wind and the Spirit is that where we do get days when it's not windy at all, God's Spirit is *always* with us. We don't have to wait for a good day to work hard and make a difference, like a miller who is dependent on the wind; we can accomplish anything we want to, every day, because the Holy Spirit empowers us non-stop (Acts 2:1-13).

So let's not waste any of the energy given to us by God. If the wind can make a windmill change grain into flour, just imagine the change we can bring here on earth if we all work together!







We would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who attended Isobel Young's funeral on Saturday 12 April 2014. Donations at the service at the West Kirk of Calder raised a generous £1343, and this amount has been added to the £813 raised by Isobel earlier in the spring at a coffee morning, also at the West Kirk and realised with the help of many in the congregation. COVENTRY'S CROSS



The people of Coventry will always remember the dreadfully long night of 14th November 1940. It was the longest air raid of the World War II and when the light dawned the next morning, Coventry was in ruins. So many people were dead, injured or homeless; there wasn't a person who had not suffered during that night.

The medieval cathedral was a burnt out shell. Two of the burnt roof beams were tied together to make a cross and this makeshift symbol was set up where the altar had been. A cross was also made from the 14th century iron nails that had held the roof together and this Cross of Nails still remains today as a symbol of sympathy, forgiveness and reconciliation. Copies of the Cross of Nails have been presented to countries round the globe as a reminder that love and understanding bind us together and that we need to remember the horrors that happen when people forget that.


