#### **Dear Congregations**

February was our Stewardship month, where we focused on time. Now we find ourselves in Lent, the time we use to reflect on the meaning of Jesus' suffering, his death on the cross, and then ultimately his resurrection.

What does Lent mean for you?

To me it's a time of walking in Jesus' footsteps, of trying to imagine what He's been through for me, for all of us...

On the way to Calvary the cross Jesus had to carry was too heavy for him, literally (Luke 23:26-43).

The soldiers had to summon someone else to carry it for him. And I think that that was almost the least of his troubles!

Because the emotional cross he had to bear — the realization that his own people didn't understand his message; that they would rather see him die on a cross than change their lives; open their eyes and see the bigger picture — that must have been much worse than trying to physically carry a heavy wooden cross with a broken body. That must have broken his heart.

Luckily Simon from Cyrene was there to carry Jesus' cross up the hill for him.

Simon was at the right place, at the right time.

I am sure that it was all part of God's plan.

He still does it today. He sends people into our lives, on our paths, to be our Simons, helping us to carry our burdens through life.

But He also sends us to be Simons for others, to help them carry their burdens.

The fact that we sometimes have to bear crosses, whether this be our own or that of others, shouldn't ever make us feel hopeless, because although bearing that cross was really hard for Jesus to do, it was also the thing that led to our salvation.

May walking in Jesus' footsteps this Lent help you to see your own life in perspective, and may God help you to realise that sometimes, even in carrying a cross, there is a blessing.


How amazing to see you


## Anne Frank- 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of her death

Many people think of Anne Frank as a Dutch girl, but she was born – and died – in Germany. This month marks the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of her death – only nine months after she recorded the final entry in her diary while hiding from the Nazis in a secret annex in Amsterdam, which had become her home town after her Jewish family had fled the Nazis.

Her full name was Annelies Marie Frank, and that last entry in the diary given to her by her father was made on 1<sup>st</sup> August, 1944. She was 15 years old. Three days later her hiding place was raided following a tip-off. She and her family were taken to Auschwitz concentration camp. Anne and her sister were later transferred to Bergen-Belsen, where they died of typhus.

Their father Otto, a former German soldier and businessman, the only member of his family to survive the death camps, was deeply moved when he discovered what his daughter had written. He arranged for parts of it to be published - now known universally as *The Diary of Anne Frank*. It has been filmed many times, adapted for the stage and translated into many languages, telling the inspiring story of how eight people survived the Nazi occupation of Amsterdam by living for over two years in a dark, concealed part of Otto's company building, protected and fed by – among others – two Christians who ran the company on the owner's behalf.

Throughout the diary runs a thread of faith, hope and love, tinged with despair. A fortnight before she was captured, the teenager wrote: "I feel the suffering of millions. And yet, when I look up at the sky, I somehow feel that everything will change for the better, that this cruelty too shall end, that peace and tranquility will return."



### St Cuthbert

In March, events are held on the 1st and 17th respectively to celebrate both St David and St Patrick but a lesser known date of 20th March marks St Cuthbert's day.

Cuthbert of Lindisfarne (c 634-87) has long been northern England's favourite saint and his name is familiar too in the south east of Scotland. It is easy to see why: Cuthbert loved God with all his heart, and loved others as himself. By all accounts, he was holy, humble, peaceable, prayerful, faithful in friendship, charming and really kind.

Cuthbert was born into a fairly well-off Anglo-Saxon family, and became a monk at Melrose in 651. He and another monk, Eata, were sent to start a monastery at Ripon, Yorkshire, but Alcfrith, who owned the land, insisted that they adopt the Roman customs, which Cuthbert's Celtic church did not allow. So Cuthbert and Eata quietly returned to Melrose, where Cuthbert became prior in about 661. Then came the Synod of Whitby in 663/4, and the Celtic Church formally decided to adopt the Roman Customs. After this, Cuthbert was sent to the island of Lindisfarne (Holy Island), off the Northumberland coast as prior, where he sensitively introduced the new ways, and won over the monks there.

Cuthbert was very much loved at Lindisfarne. His zeal was evident in his constant preaching, teaching, and visiting of the people. He was also said to have gifts of prophecy and healing.

Occasionally, Cuthbert reached 'people overload'.

Then he would retreat to the tiny nearby islet of Inner Farne, where he could pray in total seclusion.

When, to his horror, he was told he had been made Bishop of Hexham, he immediately 'swapped' sees with Eata, and stayed put at Lindisfarne as Bishop. Sadly, Cuthbert died on little nner Farne, only two years later, on 20 March, 687.

Cuthbert was buried at Lindisfarne, but that is not the end of his story. For it was only now that his travels began.

After the Vikings destroyed Lindisfarne in 875, several monks dug up his body and set out to find Cuthbert a final, and safe, resting place. Shortly after leaving the island, it is said they stopped by trees at a secluded sandstone overhang between Fenwick and Belford in Northumberland known as St Cuthbert's Cave. For the next 120 years Cuthbert was deposited in various monasteries around the north of England and southwest Scotland.

Finally, in 999, Cuthbert was allowed to rest in Durham, where a Saxon church was built over his shrine.

All that travel must have done him good; when his body was exhumed to be put into the new Norman Cathedral in Durham in 1104, it was said to be still in perfect tact, and 'incorrupt'.




