Dear Congregations

The beauty of autumn is all around us in the changing colours of the leaves and skies and we enter the season of remembering, recalling our memories of places we have known; people we have known we dearly miss and see no longer. We will hold be reavement services in December as part of our season on remembrance.

But first our main remembering will be around Armistice Sunday when we will remember those who gave of their lives in wars for our freedom. We honour them and all those from our parishes who gave their lives for the greater good. Whilst we also recall the horror, and the sacrifice of war. Reading the names of those from the area who lost their lives in the wars of the 20th century is a huge privilege, and here it is a deeply profound experience because the surnames are those still familiar in local life (in a way that is less direct in bigger towns and cities). We have the privilege of living in close knit communities – it is my prayer that we can continue to honour the generations who have shaped our communities by the love we continue to show for each other.

I'd like to share a story with you. It's called Tusk Tusk by David McKee.

Once upon a time long, long ago all the elephants in the world were black or white. They loved all creatures ... But they hated each other, and each kept to their own side of the jungle. One day the black elephants decided to kill all the white elephants. And the white ones decided to kill the black. The peace-loving elephants from each side went to live deep in the darkest jungle. They were never seen again. A battle began. It went on and on and on. Until all the elephants were asleep. For years no elephants were seen. Then one day the grandchildren of the peace-loving elephants came out of the jungle. They were grey. Since then the

elephants have lived in peace. But some of the grey elephants noticed that they had different shaped ears to some of the others. The End.

On Armistice Sunday we share our memories, thoughts and reflections. Words from the Bible will be read, for example the words of Jesus in Matthew 5, 'Blessed are the peacemakers'. Sometimes words from the prophets are read such as Isaiah 2: 2 "they shall beat their swords into ploughshares, and their spears into pruning hooks..... Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore." This expresses the Christian longing and hope for a time when God's love and goodness will transform our world.

We give thanks for the selfless sacrifice of many. Whilst confessing the failings of a sinful human race. We pray for peace on earth and an end to the madness & waste of war. In the bible the prophet Micah predicts terrible times of war for the people of Israel. But then he goes on with this amazing vision – the day when peace will replace warfare and swords will be made into ploughs.

Of course, ultimate peace and justice and joy will come only at the end of time in the Kingdom of God. But that doesn't mean that we just sit and wait – it is never too soon to start cultivating the oasis of peace in the desert of our war mongering world.

In the words of Mahatma Ghandi, "Peace is not something that you wish for. It is something that you make, something that you do, something that you are, something that you give away." If we truly want to honour those who died in war, we can do no better than by building a more peaceful loving world for their children and ours. So, let us be peace to one another.

Peace begins in our families, our communities our nation. It is my hope that our remembering together this year re-invigorates that spirit of service, love and care that represents the best of human nature. Peace is our gift.

Reflection based on Deuteronomy 30:9-14 (Rev Alison Quilter) '.....the word is very near to you' v14

⁹ Then the LORD your God will make you most prosperous in all the work of your hands and in the fruit of your womb, the young of your livestock and the crops of your land. The LORD will again delight in you and make you prosperous, just as he delighted in your ancestors, ¹⁰ if you obey the LORD your God and keep his commands and decrees that are written in this Book of the Law and turn to the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul. ¹¹ Now what I am commanding you today is not too difficult for you or beyond your reach. ¹² It is not up in heaven, so that you have to ask, 'Who will ascend into heaven to get it and proclaim it to us so that we may obey it?' ¹³ Nor is it beyond the sea, so that you have to ask, 'Who will cross the sea to get it and proclaim it to us so that we may obey it?' ¹⁴ No, the word is very near you;

The Israelites' long wilderness wanderings are almost over, and the reading above forms part of an extended speech of Moses to the people of Israel on the verge of their entry into the Promised Land. The people's history in the desert has been a chequered one, their experiences of closeness to God alternating with times of alienation on account of their disobedience.

But here and now says Moses, is the promise of a bright new future, and the people's current situation is expectant with possibility. In the past, it was never God who turned away from his people; rather it was the people who abandoned God. Appealing to their hidden reserves of faith, hope and courage, Moses tells them that the God they seek is much closer to them than they ever imagined; God's word in not beyond the sea or up in heaven, but 'in your mouth and in your heart for you to observe'.

There is much in this passage about the choices we make in life, and the Israelites' experience here reminds us that the decisions we make in our own particular circumstances will carry consequences, for good or ill. We are urged to listen: to listen to the still small voice of God within our hearts. We won't always get it right, but if are truly seeking God's way, we will discover that God is indeed 'very near' and faithful to us.

Prayer

Loving God, thank you that instead of compelling me to serve you invite me respond to your love; that rather than dictating the course I should take you give me signposts to follow, leaving it up to me whether or not I take not of them. Help me to use that freedom wisely, trusting you to lead. Give me wisdom and courage to make the right decisions, at the right time and in the right place. Amen.



In memory of John Moffat

John was born at number 2 Wilson
Terrace, Bents to David and Catherine
Moffat. He had an older sister, Jean, who
is sadly no longer with us and his wee
sister Aline. He went to the local school
and left at the age of 14 starting to work
as an apprentice joiner with the Coal
Board. From the age of 19 to 21 John did
his National Service. He served with the
RAF Regiment in Catterick & Germany.
After his National Service he worked as
a journeyman joiner with the West



Calder Co-Operative Society. Thereafter he established Moffat & Spence with his brother-in-law, Robert, in 1958 which traded until 1967. He then went on to work on various building sites with companies like George Wimpey and Miller Homes and as a self-employed joiner with Alpine Double Glazing and Swedish Pine Kitchens. He retired in 1995.

John met the lovely Margaret at his sister Jean's wedding. A friendship blossomed into a romance and they got married on the 6th of August 1954. Eight years later Sandra was born. A beautiful daughter he and Margaret doted on. When Sandra met, and later married, David, John welcomed him into their small family like the son he never had and his family was complete when his grandchildren, twins Cameron & Kirsten, were born in 1996. He loved being a grandfather and they were the apple of his eye. He was so proud of everything they achieved, and he was always keen to hear what was happening in their lives.

He was completely devoted to his wife and helped to look after Margaret in the last couple of years, learning to cook and bake – with instructions from her – although he did come up with some strange concoctions when left to his own devices!

He was a church elder at the West Kirk of Calder, and in this role also made a positive difference in the lives of so many people. As a keen singer, he was a member of the church choir, male voice choir, and he was also part of an amalgamation of choirs that sang for the late Queen Elizabeth II.

When John retired, he became a volunteer driver with the McMillan Nurses.

He took up wood carving and was exceptionally talented at it! A multitude of Christmas reindeer were made! The Millennium Candle Stand and a beautiful picture of the West Kirk in the vestry are some examples of the many things that he did. There will be quite a few folk in the congregation who will be the proud owner of a piece of his work.

He was one of the founder members of the Community Council in West Calder and always took a keen interest in what was, or was not, happening within the village. Local MSPs were on first name terms with him given the frequency of his visits to their office when things were not up to the standards he expected for the village. A well-kent face within the community, he had time for everyone; a true gentleman of the old school.

He had the vision to create the 'Twa Bob Bench - Mile Awa', as a tribute to two friends, which has become a local landmark and focal point in West Calder and is now a recognised point of interest on Google Maps.

John was a great family man. He was selfless, sensible, reliable, always there for others and he put others before himself. He had a wonderful outlook on life, and probably never even realised what a great man he was. He was a true role model.



Honour the brave men and women this Remembrance Day By baking some Lemon Poppy Biscuits

INGREDIENTS

½ cup butter, at room temperature

3/4 cup icing sugar

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1 ½ tablespoons finely grated lemon zest

2 tablespoons lemon juice

1 tablespoon poppy seeds

2 cups plain flour

½ teaspoon salt

Decorating the biscuits

4 cups icing sugar 2 tablespoons lemon juice Red and black food colouring Poppy seeds, *for sprinkling*

INSTRUCTIONS

Beat the butter, sugar, vanilla, lemon zest and juice until combined. Beat in flour, salt, and poppy seeds. Form dough into a ball, wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate until firm, at least 2 hours

Preheat oven to 350 degrees

Turn dough out onto a lightly floured surface and roll out to ¼-inch thickness. Cut out cookies using 2 or three different size cookie cutters. Transfer to a baking sheet and refrigerate for 30 minutes

Bake until the edges just start to brown, 10-12 minutes. Remove from oven and cool completely

Make icing Mix the icing sugar and lemon juice in a medium-sized bowl. Add more lemon juice if too thick or more icing sugar if too thin. Tint a large portion red, a small portion black, and leave the remainder white

We extend a very warm welcome to any children who would like to play a part in the Nativity service, however large or small a part you would like, we have a space saved especially for you!



MERCY SHIPS

The blessing of the second hospital ship, Global Mercy, took place on 2nd June at Port Automone in Dakar.

This is the world's largest civilian hospital ship and training centre preparing to serve Africa for the first time and will be the site for life transforming surgery.

Spaces have been assigned to host 950 crew and guests with a 682-seat auditorium, school, gym, swimming pool, café, shop and library. Local medical professionals have been trained on board at Senegal while Africa Mercy is docked alongside to provide lifesaving surgeries.
