Letter from our OLM

Dear Congregations

The coronation ceremony of King Charles III will take place at Westminster Abbey on Saturday 6 May and



conducted by The Archbishop of Canterbury, will be the centrepiece of the coronation weekend (6-8) May. It will be a service rooted in Christian symbolism, reflecting the king's role today whilst looking to the future.

The ceremony will be followed by a day of community celebration (The coronation Big Lunch, Sunday 7 May) and a day of volunteering and service (The Big Help Out 8 May). Building on themes of community, the coronation weekend will be a celebratory moment, a chance for people to come together and for churches to share an invitational message about the Christian faith.

Our churches will come together on Sunday 7 May at 10am for a joint service at the West Kirk followed by a celebration afternoon tea to which all are welcome – bring a friend or two.

As God's people we too continue to celebrate the one true king, the risen Christ, who gives us the great hope, love for us to play our role today and future demonstrating discipleship to others and the wider community. Jesus showed us how to love, show kindness, forgiveness,

I know first hand of your love as I recover from illness which took me out of 'action' for a while. Your kindness, love and compassion shown through the many cards and messages received, the flowers and above all the 'space' afforded me to heal knowing I was upheld in prayer by you was overwhelming. You have no idea how much this meant to me. Thank you!



Unitary Constitution: an update for our congregations.

Last month, we explained that both our congregations currently have a Kirk Session and a separate Congregational Board to take care of property and finance matters.

Central Church is keen that all congregations operate under the Unitary Constitution model and at recent Annual Stated Meetings in March our congregations agreed unanimously to move to that model.

At its most recent meeting, Presbytery has agreed with these decisions and is now forwarding our applications for the issue of a Unitary Constitution to the 'Delegation of Assembly'. This effectively means that by the autumn both congregations are likely to be served by a Kirk Session with a supporting committee structure.




Our first official event in our new Parish Grouping:



BUNTING BISCUITS

FROM THE BBC GOOD FOOD PAGE

Ingredients

- 350g <u>plain flour</u>, plus a little extra for rolling
- 100g cold butter, diced
- 1 tsp <u>bicarbonate of soda</u>
- 140g <u>light soft brown sugar</u>
- 1 large egg
- 75g golden syrup
- 2 tsp vanilla extract

To decorate

- 1kg pack ready-to-roll icing
- few food colourings and writing icing pens, in your favourite colours
- icing sugar, for rolling

Method

. STEP 1

Put the flour, butter, bicarb and sugar in a food processor, whizz until you can't see any lumps of butter, then tip into a mixing bowl. Whisk the egg, syrup and vanilla together, then stir into the bowl with a wooden spoon. Using your hands, knead together into a smooth dough.



· STEP 2

Heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Cut a triangle template from card the size you want the bunting to be. Roll out dough on a lightly floured surface.

Use template to cut out triangles – re-roll trimmings to get as many as you can. Line some baking sheets with baking parchment and lift on the biscuits.

Use a pencil end to make 2 holes in the top of each one – not too close to the edge.

Bake, one tray at a time, for 8-10 mins, remaking each hole when biscuits are just out and still soft. Cool.

Un-iced biscuits can be frozen for up to 3 months or will keep in an airtight container for a week.

• STEP 3

Divide the icing into as many colours as you want and knead in food colourings to get your desired colours.

Roll out thinly on a surface lightly dusted with icing sugar and use your template to cut out icing triangles.

Brush the backs of the icing with a little water and stick onto the biscuits – making holes in the icing to match the biscuits as you go.

Cut out small circles from leftover icing, brush backs with water and stick onto some of the biscuits.

Decorate with icing pens, if you wish, then carefully thread through ribbon or string and hang up your treats.
