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
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Dear Friends

As you all know, we usually go to South Africa for the summer, but this year my



dad turned 80 on the 4th of August, and we invited him and my aunt to come spend the summer with us in Scotland. I feel so privileged to have had them here for almost a month! We travelled all over the country with them – we took them to some of our favourite spots, and also discovered new places with them. After living in Scotland for more than 15 years now, it was amazing to see this lovely country we call home through their eyes. They loved *absolutely everything*, and they even tolerated the weather! (Our summer was just a wee bit *colder* than the South African winter, so we don't have any holiday photos where they are not wearing thick jackets, but to them that was part of the Scottish charm!)

All the excitement about having them here and sharing this wonderful adventure with them, made me realise just how easily we take things for granted. My dad said: "Scotland is breathtakingly beautiful, clean, and safe. The people are friendly, kind, and caring. And everything works."

Is this the way you see Scotland too? I think sometimes we can focus so much on the things we don't like, the things that frustrate us, and the things that could be better, that we forget how many things we do have to be thankful for...

The first 2 verses of Psalm 100 sums up what our attitude towards life should be: "Shout for joy to the Lord, all the earth. Worship the Lord with gladness; come before him with joyful songs."

We should always be thankful. Because God loves us. Even when our lives aren't perfect. Scotland might not have wall-to-wall sunshine and blue skies all the time, but when you come to think about it, there are things much more important than the weather. And just like that, our lives might not always make for a perfect picture, but that doesn't make them any less special – because what we do have, are gifts from God. Through every single one of us he is making the world a little more meaningful. So, let's praise him for that, and always keep our lights shining – especially as the nights are starting to draw in now...

Reflection based on Ephesians 5:15-20

¹⁵ Be careful then how you live, not as unwise people but as wise, ¹⁶ making the most of the time, because the days are evil. ¹⁷ So do not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is. ¹⁸ Do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery; but be filled with the Spirit, ¹⁹ as you sing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs among yourselves, singing and making melody to the Lord in your hearts, ²⁰ giving thanks to God the Father at all times and for everything in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Time. Our relationship with it is one of the greatest stressors of our age. There is never enough of it. Our obsession with finding faster ways of doing things makes no difference. 'Time Management' is one of the most frequent searches on the internet and one of the most popular management courses.

But 'making the most of the time' suggests something different. There is certainly a call to live wisely and responsibly here, but rather than a call to improve our organisational skills we are being invited to live in time's fullness. This is not about the quantity of time managed so much as the quality of time lived.

If we are to make the most of the challenges and opportunities of life, we will need a trusting relationship with time. Without it, our best intended activities will tend to be anxious, driven, reactive and increasingly lacking in depth.

What might it mean to live as if these really is time enough?

Time is God's gift. So, the first response might be to develop a habit of gratitude in relation to it. God allows time to be time. Time gives life its priorities and direction. There is gift in the constraints time places upon our activities. Without time, nothing would have any more significance than anything else. Time is not working against us or denying us our truest vocation. Therefore, thank God for time.

Prayer:

Loving God, give me wisdom to discern the best way to use my time and my influence. Open my eyes to see the temptation the evil one puts in my path. Give me courage to boldly stand for you and sensitivity to know the best way to bless others according to their needs. Amen.

In memory of Catriona Lachlan-Curtis



In July we sadly lost our talented

organist, Catriona. She had such a colourful personality and could make the world a joyful place with her music – she had the right tune for every occasion and no matter how small or big the occasion, she was always happy to be there to provide the music.

Here are some of the highlights of her life:

In her 40 years Catriona had more experiences than many twice her age.

She was born in Nairobi, Kenya, on the 22nd of April 1983, and referred to herself as Cat of Kenya.

She lived with her family in the PCEA Chogoria Hospital from 1983-1989 as her parents, Geoff and Maggie, were seconded there by the Church of Scotland. There, they had an idyllic community life in an international setting, on the slope of Mount Kenya.

Cat went to Chogoria nursery, after which she was home schooled by Maggie, with Alastair and Neil, up to primary 2.

The family moved back to Scotland in 1989 in the week of Cat's 6th birthday.

They lived on a croft beside Neptunes Staircase, in Banavie, Fort William. Here she started her own flock of Cheviot sheep, as the first lamb on the Croft was born on her 7th birthday.

She always loved animals, especially their deerhounds, Harris and Merlin, and their haflinger ponies.

She attended Banavie Primary school then Lochaber High school.

She was an active member of the Mustard Seed Church.

Music was her passion! She played piano from age 7, and flute and harp from around age 10.

She played the flute in the Highland Regional Youth Orchestra, as well as in many other orchestras and wind bands.

Cat had a gap-year in St Andrews Church of Scotland guest house, Jerusalem, from 2000-2001, where she got engaged to Azar in Bethlehem just before leaving.

She then attended the School of Oriental and African studies at London University, where she obtained a Degree in Ethnomusicology.

During that time she had many trips abroad and holiday jobs.

She separated from Azar in 2003, then met Roy in London in 2004.

They got married in 2005 and moved to Edinburgh the following year.

They then moved to Polbeth in 2007 where Pippa was born in 2008, Theo in 2011, Louisa-Faith in 2014 and Gabriel in 2017.

Cat and Roy first came to Polbeth Harwood Church in 2010, and she became the church organist there when Theo was just a baby. She would often play on Sundays with Theo attached to her front in a sling.

Cat and Roy officially became members of the church in 2014, so that they could vote for Nanda to become the minister!

Herald was introduced to the church family by Catriona when Gabriel was one year old.

She became the organist at the West Kirk of Calder in 2019.

During lockdown she would initially record hymns for our online services at home, but as soon as she was allowed to, she would record these at church, with the help of Sandra, and there was always lots of laughter involved. Cat had such an amazing sense of humour!

She loved baking with her kids and often delivered cakes to a friend or someone who was ill or having a tough time. She was very thoughtful.

Roy, Herald, and Cat's 4 lovely children, our 'church bairns', are all an integral part of our church family, just like Cat was, and we are thankful for them, and for every single special memory we have of Cat here in our churches and community.

Cat is dearly missed...

May she rest in peace.





New Unitary Constitution

Our congregations agreed unanimously at the last Annual Stated Meetings to apply to General Assembly to adopt the recommended Unitary system of congregational management. During the summer break, our requests were ratified, and appropriate paperwork has been received from Assembly offices.

What does that now mean for us?

After September, the Congregational Boards of both congregations will cease to exist, and financial and property matters will be managed through Session. However, in order to manage all the functions of church life, a new structure comprising a network of committees is being set up.

In each congregation, there will be 5 main committees, headed by a convener, who will report back bimonthly to Session. These will broadly cover the topics of Mission; Stewardship & Fellowship; Property; Pastoral Care; Admin & Communication.

However, under each of these five functions, there will be a variety of relevant topics where there will be opportunities for people to become involved at different levels in a wide range of aspects of church life.

To give a feeling of what is coming and an opportunity for everyone to become involved, each congregation is having an introductory meeting over teas and coffees following morning worship.


