Reflection based on Psalm 89:1-2

- ¹ I will sing of your steadfast love, O LORD, or ever; with my mouth I will proclaim your faithfulness to all generations.
- ² I declare that your steadfast love is established for ever; your faithfulness is as firm as the heavens.

Do you ever thumb through your old diaries? It's like looking into a window of time that represented the future but now concerns the past. Birthdays, appointments, events, anniversaries and many other key dates. The diary contains all that you once anticipated but are now memories or even forgotten. 12 months of your life that together comprise another chapter in your life's journey. And the plot that binds all those chapters together, that gives meaning and cohesion to every passing year - well for the writer of the Psalm it is simple: the faithfulness of God. Through all of life's ups and downs, the psalmist declares, one thing that never changes: God's unfailing love, unchanged from the beginning of time, permanent in the heavens.

The hymn by Thomas Chisolm 'Great is thy faithfulness, O God my Father' there is no shadow of turning from thee; thou

changest not, thy compassions, they fail not. As thou has been Thou forever wilt be.'

These wonderful words, a wonderful testimony echoed in this hymn, that's the confidence with which we can say farewell to one season and prepare for the next one. No one knows what the next season will bring - laughter, tears, health, sickness, triumph, disappointment. What we do know is that whatever it brings, whatever we face, God will be with us in it, to the end of time and beyond.

Prayer:

Eternal God, thank you for the way you have worked throughout history, calling and leading your people. You have guided, blessed and forgiven and encouraged us in our life's journey. Thank you for your assurance that you will be with us each day. For your great faithfulness, yesterday, today and tomorrow receive our praise. Amen.





In memory of Kenny MacKay



Kenny was born in Dunoon on the 19th of October 1933, to John and Isabella MacKay. He was the youngest of 11.

After he left school, he worked as a joiner's apprentice; then in 1954 he joined the army to do his national service.

It was during this time, whilst stationed at Redford Barracks in Edinburgh, that he took the opportunity to visit his sister,

Helen, who stayed in Polbeth. And that is where he met Alice, who lived next door.

At that time, they were one of the very few households who had a TV, and Kenny – who had a very good sense of humour – always joked that he got invited over to watch the telly and then never escaped!

He finished his national service in 1956, returned to Dunoon briefly, and then moved back to Polbeth to be with Alice.

They got married on the 7th of September 1957 in Harwood Church in West Calder.

Shona was born in August 1960, and Morag in September 1962. His grandchildren are Christopher, Jill and Karyn. His great grandchildren are Leah, Zoe, Finlay, Oliver and Luca. He loved his family with his whole heart.

Kenny worked as a joiner on various building sites, but he decided he wanted to better himself so, he started day release classes at Bathgate College, resulting in him gaining his 'city and guilds'. He then progressed to being clerk of works for the Rank organisation, then moved on to Gumleys, and after that, to the Livingston Development Corporation.

He then accepted the position of *Master of Works* at the Royal Highland and Agricultural Society of Scotland. Kenny worked there till he retired almost 20 years later.

It was in his last year before he retired, that he learned he had been awarded an M.B.E. for Services to Agriculture in the 1998 Queens New Year's Honours list. He received this award at a ceremony in Holyrood House Palace in Edinburgh on the 1st of July 1998.

Kenny played the bagpipes and was a member of the local pipe band Whitrigg & Polkemmet, in Whitburn. He was also a member of the Edinburgh Piping Society. After giving up playing in a band, he loved going back to his hometown of Dunoon every year for the Cowal Games.

Kenny was an elder and friend to all at Polbeth Harwood Church. He attended worship regularly and worked hard for our church, making a difference wherever he went.

He was a keen caravaner and the family had many holidays touring the UK. Once the girls had grown up, Kenny and Alice enjoyed many special holidays in their favourite destination of Stratford upon Avon.

Kenny was an amazing person. He was loved by so many people, and he will be sorely missed. He passed away on the 11th of August at Redmill Nursing Home.

May he rest in peace.
