Reflection By Rev Dr Nanda Groenewald

Galatians 5:24 (ICB): Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified their own sinful selves. They have given up their old selfish feelings and the evil things they wanted to do.

What does Easter mean in our personal lives?

Jesus gave his life, so that we may live. And anybody who fully understands that, knows that it has to have some impact on our lives. What is our reaction to what God did for us in Jesus?

In Galatians 5 we read that if we belong to Jesus, that means that we should crucify our own sinful selves... In other words, we should leave behind everything that shouldn't be part of a child of God's life. I find the metaphor that we should "crucify" these things, very poignant.

Because crucifixion is hard, and it's final.


But if Jesus could give his *life* on the cross, the least we can do is to get rid of our selfish feelings and do our best to glorify his name in everything we do, think and say...

They have asked that the bags could be returned with a few coins inside which will go to the Christian Aid Earthquake appeal.


Please remember to return the bags if you were lucky enough to receive one on the day.

In memory of Stewart MacRae

On the 14th of March 2023, our Session Clerk at the West Kirk of Calder, sadly passed away. Stewart was a lovely man who worked very hard for the church, and his presence is missed greatly by his family, friends, church family and the community. We will never forget the man he was and the difference he made...

Alexander Stewart MacRae was born on the 15th of March 1946, at Chester Street Private Hospital in Edinburgh, to parents Margaret (whose maiden name was Stewart) and Ivor Menzies MacRae (who was a major in the Royal Indian Army.)

They lived in Edinburgh before moving to Bathgate, where Stewart's little sister Margo, was born.

At a young age, Stewart and Margo embarked on an adventure with their parents – they emigrated to Australia, traveling a long way by boat. Unfortunately, this was not to work out for them, as Stewart's dad took ill and they had to move back to Scotland.

Stewart left school at the end of 6th year in 1964. He applied for a job as an apprentice Town Chamberlain in the burgh of Whitburn, and he got the job. He was given the chance to attend Glasgow University to help further his career.

In 1968, computers were the new thing. Bob Marshall, a friend of Stewart's, worked with computers for the National Coal Board. Stewart decided to go for a job interview there.

On Tuesday the 10th of September 1968, Stewart went for his aptitude test at the Computer Centre in Sighthill, Edinburgh; and this is where he met Shirley. Shirley worked at the front desk and

took him up in the lift for his test – and the rest, as they say, is history!

Stewart got the job, and over the years went on to sit many exams in Computing and Software, and eventually he became the manager of the Computer Centre.

Stewart and Shirley started dating, and they were married in the West Kirk on the 22nd of April 1972. They lived in Boghall, Bathgate, where they had their first child, Callum, in 1973.

When Callum was 2 and a half years old, they made the move to West Calder. This is where they extended their family – Isla was born in 1976, followed by Stewart in 1981.

Fast forward to 51 years of marriage – the kids have all grown up, got married, and have families of their own – expanding Stewart's family to include 2 amazing daughters-in-law, a son-in-law, and 7 grandkids.

These new additions to Stewart and Shirley's family made them feel complete, and they were thankful to have a family filled with love and happiness.

Stewart was very active in the community – both in West Calder as a whole and in Westmuir Road. He helped with the Gala Day float, assisted with arranging post–Gala evening barn dances and BBQs, and helped to stage the annual Guy Fawkes Night fireworks display, to name but a few of the many things he did.

Furthermore, Stewart had an illustrious life of service to the community through Scouting. He became Scout Leader of the Bathgate Boghall Troop in 1966 and when he moved to West

Calder in 1975 he became leader of the West Calder Cub Pack. Later still, in 1992, he was appointed Group Scout Leader.

Stewart loved God and our church, and he was the beating heart of so many things that happened at the West Kirk. He was first ordained as an elder in January 1973 in Bathgate, and then admitted to the West Kirk Session in December 1975. When he was younger, he was the leader of the youth fellowship, and he has been Session Clerk for more than 20 years, doing so much more than what was expected of him. He was proud to receive his long service certificate. Never missing a beat, quietly and unassumingly doing whatever was needed for the church, as if it was no effort at all.

Stewart's life can be summed up as: a man devoted to his family; possessed of an enduring Christian faith; and an outstanding record of service to his community. He was a true and loyal friend to many.

We were blessed to have Stewart in our lives and in our church, and our heartfelt condolences go out to his wife Shirley and his lovely family.

As a church we would also like to thank his family for the retiring collection at his funeral.

May he rest in peace.

Unitary Constitution – The way forward

The Kirks with the "Unitary Constitution", known as quoad omnia (for all purposes) parishes, allow the single body of the Kirk Session and its constituent committees to oversee both civil and ecclesiastical issues. These include everything from property to pastoral care and from finance to vision for the future.

The above quote is taken from the Church of Scotland website but what does it mean for us?

Currently both our churches have a board and separate session who deal with different aspects of the daily governance of our churches. By moving to a unitary constitution, we will, effectively, amalgamate all of this to our elders.

To ensure that everyone can still help in all the essential tasks within the church, there will be smaller sub committees who will meet regularly and report into our session meetings.

This won't happen overnight as there are still some legalities to finalise, but we will keep you up to date as changes happen.

This letter was written by one of our elders, Beryl Henderson, to the Church of Scotland magazine, Life & Work, and has been published in its April edition.

Who looks after ministers?

With all the changes that are taking place in the church just now, and in the future, has anyone given any thought as to how our ministers are going to cope?

No rest for your Treasurers though as we've started the Annual Accounts for 2023 - it's a continual process 😂




